# The Palm Coast Historian

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Nomination of Mayor James Canfield as Cities of Excellence Mayor of the Year

The following letter was written to the Florida League of Cities by Art Dycke, our city's Co-Historian and a member of the Board of Directors of the Palm Coast Historical Society. He is also the author of *Images of America: Palm Coast*. This letter was written to nominate Mayor James Canfield as Cities of Excellence Mayor of the Year.

"There would not presently be a City of Palm Coast Historical Society if Mayor James Canfield had not initiated and supported the organization. I first met Jim Canfield at a meeting of the Palm Coast Home Rule Coalition. He was Chairman of the group working on a plan to incorporate Palm Coast as a city. As an adjunct professor in history, economics and government at the Palm Coast branch of Daytona Beach Community College, I joined the group as a non-partisan advisor involved in the writing of a city charter.

I watched Chairman Jim Canfield methodically and efficiently bring diverse and often squabbling group members together on innumerable issues at countless meetings that ultimately led to a successful community vote to incorporate the city of Palm Coast. I watched him campaign tirelessly in a field of 28 candidates running for City Council and Mayor and easily win the title, Mayor James Canfield. I know that his years of work for the benefit of his fellow citizens was done out of affection for them because the remuneration he was to receive as mayor was a "whopping \$1,500 per year.

Palm Coast was fortunate in also electing diverse and dedicated City Councilmen who together chose a talented City Manager who shared their affection and knowledge of the Palm Coast Community. In my opinion, this administrative team continues to be a resounding success in its leadership of the City of Palm Coast founded December 31, 1999.

Our first City Hall consisted of two small rooms with a large closet in the existing Community Center building. In the closet were two large boxes of papers, letters, projected budgets, official incorporation commission reports, etc, that were indeed the existing archives for the new city. Mayor Canfield asked me to move the boxes from the closet and store them, which I did in my garage. In April of 2000, Mayor Canfield asked me to become the volunteer City Historian which I accepted along with long time resident Margaret Davie. We were appointed Co-Historians by the City Council.

Mayor Canfield provided us with space in a small conference room in our first real City Hall. It was there that we began conducting audio taped interviews with residents telling about the early days of Palm Coast. Mayor Canfield's wife, Mary Ann, suggested the names of people to interview, participated in the process, and has been an active officer of the City of Palm Coast Historical Society from its inception.

Mayor Canfield and City Manager Kelton asked us to form an official Historical Society, which we did. The ITT Corporation had left us a considerable number of papers, pictures and files, all of which were stored, completely unorganized, in City Hall. One of the Historical Society's fundraising events was a large garage sale at our Community Center. Mayor Canfield personally constructed the stanchion and wood framework that supported the sign advertising the sale.

Mayor Canfield initiated a Cultural Arts funding for non-profit organizations under which our Historical Society received a grant and which, fortunately, we continue to receive from the city. I will repeat my opening statement: 'There would not presently be a City of Palm Coast Historical Society if Mayor James Canfield had not initiated and supported the organization.'

As a result of my contact with the historical materials that Mayor Canfield asked me to preserve, I have published a book in Arcadia Publishers historical series entitled *Images of America: Palm Coast.* The book is dedicated in part to 'talented civic volunteers and government leaders who selflessly contribute enormous amounts of time and energy for the enrichment and benefit of the community in which the serve.' (Page 4) This quotation describes Mayor James Canfield perfectly.

Others will describe things that the mayor has done for our fast growing city but I am hoping to provide some historical perspective. I am sending you a copy of my book which I believe reflects a community with a vibrant spirit in an environmentally beautiful setting being led by a dedicated and visionary city administration headed by Mayor James Canfield."

Palm Coast Recreation and Parks Department has earned the Start Smart 5-Star designation from the National Alliance for Youth Sports. Start Smart gives children the opportunity to learn the basics of a sport, such as basketball, baseball, golf and soccer, without the pressure of competition. Frank Barbagallo, Recreation Coordinator, initiated the program. Palm Coast is the first in the state to earn the designation. Way to go Frank!!

FPC Students design 'Project Disk' to help save missing children. By Scott Wyland, Reprinted from News-Journal

"PALM COAST - One child missing is one too many.

That mantra, adopted by 10 students in Flagler Palm Coast High's gifted class and supported by the School Board, Sheriff Jim Manfre and state Rep. Doug Wiles, D-St. Augustine, led to a program that's earning praise from a software developer and child advocacy group.

Called 'Project Disk,' short for Digital Identification System for Kids, it aims to document kindergarteners' portraits and personal data. A child's photo and basic personal data – age, height, color of eyes – are loaded onto a disk and given to the parents.

If the child turns up missing, the parents can distribute the information quickly.

While programs like it have been set up at retail outlets and other businesses, officials with the software developer, New Jersey-based Family Trusted Products, said it's the first time it's been done at the schools.

Frank Florio, the company's president, praised the students for accomplishing what politicians in several Northern states have failed to do.

Each of Flagler's four elementary schools this year will receive a \$605 kit containing software, a digital camera, and 200 computer disks. Children will be photographed while they register for kindergarten. David Poliner, a 15-year-old student involved with Project Disk, said he hopes the effort spreads."

O Joy – moving from cold New Jersey to sunny Ft. Lauderdale for boating, golfing, swimming and other fun things! However, our joy of 15 years turned to sorrow when, over a period of time, our friends living around us were being burglarized! I finally said the tragic words to Skip, "we have to think about moving."

#### Images of America: Palm Coast by local author, Art Dycke.

The book is a compilation of 238 captioned photographs from the ITT (ICDC) files that are now held by the Palm Coast Historical Society. Contributions of local residents, reporters and newspapers are also included in the book. *Images* is a concise introduction to our area's history, organizations, people and their activities. Arcadia, the publisher, describes the book as follows:

"What is paradise? Before 1969, land that would eventually become the City of Palm Coast was considered by some as nothing more than a 'big pine-covered swamp.' But when the corporate eyes of ITT/Levitt and Sons looked upon the virtually uninhabited land, they saw 22,000 acres of golf courses, marinas, oceanfront motels, scenic drives, and house lots awaiting the arrival of sun-seeking 'pioneers.' Marketing strategies targeting urban residents in the North and Midwest offered slices of land cut out of miles of forest, and soon a 500-mile infrastructure of roads, utilities, and sewer lines bound Palm Coast to a future that included becoming the largest planned unit development in Florida history."

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
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
