The City of Palm Coast Historical Society is proud to announce the arrival of *Images of America: Palm Coast* by local author, Art Dycke.

The book is a compilation of 238 captioned photographs from the ITT (ICDC) files that are now held by the Palm Coast Historical Society. Contributions of local residents, reporters and newspapers are also included in the book. *Images* is a concise introduction to our area's history, organizations, people and their activities.

Arcadia, the publisher, describes the book on the back cover as follows:

"What is paradise? Before 1969, land that would eventually become the City of Palm Coast was considered by some as nothing more than a 'big pine-covered swamp.' But when the corporate eyes of ITT/Levitt and Sons looked upon the virtually uninhabited land, they saw 22,000 acres of golf courses, marinas, oceanfront motels, scenic drives, and house lots awaiting the arrival of sun-seeking 'pioneers.' Marketing strategies targeting urban residents in the North and Midwest offered slices of land cut out of miles of forest, and soon a 500-mile infrastructure of roads, utilities, and sewer lines bound Palm Coast to a future that included becoming the largest planned unit development in Florida history.

Perhaps some considered it paradise when life was so secluded that it took a 13-mile drive to buy a quart of milk; perhaps others found 'the perfect place to live' when errands were shortened by a new shopping center in 1979. Now comprising about two-thirds of Flagler County's population, Palm Coast continues to attract residents and visitors alike. With a fascinating collection of photographs and illustrations, Arthur E. Dycke, city co-historian, a director of the City of Palm Coast Historical Society, and an adjunct faculty member at Daytona Beach Community College, presents this whirlwind history of a wilderness turned 'paradise.'

The *Images of America* series celebrates the history of neighborhoods, towns, and cities across the country. Using archival photographs, each title presents the distinctive stories from the past that shape the character of the community today. Arcadia is proud to play a part in the preservation of local heritage, making history available to all."

Pioneers of Palm Coast Adventures By Art Dycke

I have experienced considerable joy in interviewing and sometimes audio taping early settlers of Palm Coast. Now, at various book signings for *Images of America: Palm Coast*, new stories are beginning to surface.

The first involves an early resident's report of a burglar in his house that he heard and immediately called the sheriff about. Although it took some time for the police to travel to Palm Coast, they finally apprehended the robber who had gotten completely lost in the labyrinth of roads laid out by ITT! In confirming this story, Zane Kelley, now a security officer at Flagler/Palm Coast High School admitted, "I was almost as confused as the burglar".

For the second story, I am reprinting the letter I received from Belle Surdin exactly the way she wrote it to me.

"At the request of Mrs. Sandra Rose Friedman, I am sending you the story of my adventure in Palm Coast in December 1973—never to be forgotten.

The Legend of Palm Coast 1973

"It was December 1973 that we moved to Palm Coast, located 30 minutes north of Daytona Beach and 30 minutes south of St. Augustine, from Merrick, L.I. Palm Coast was a very rural and new area with very few homes, unpaved roads, and no street signs posted. We enjoyed being away from the hustle and bustle of city life.

One day, after dinner, I decided to take a bicycle ride to explore the territory. It was getting very dark and suddenly (I had lost my sense of direction) I could not find my way back as I was surrounded by thick bushes and tall trees. I called for help at the top of my voice, but the area was deserted. The only landmark I recognized was the lit tower of the Welcome Center on the other side of many small canals that separated me. So I took off my shoes, left them on the bank of the canal, parked my bicycle on the shore, and jumped into one of the canals with all my clothes on.

The canals were sometimes inhabited by alligators. To my dismay, when I reached the other side of the canal, I found there were many more canals to overcome.

There was no turning back so I continued to swim four more canals crosswise to reach my destination.

Finally, exhausted, I reached the Welcome Center but had to climb up the oyster-shelled bank that was very sharp. It was very dark and I lay on the shore, breathless, hoping someone would come along, but the street was deserted. It was 9 PM. In desperation, I went to the nearest house and rang the bell. The surprised woman who answered the door was most sympathic (I was a sorry sight.) and, notwithstanding my dripping wet all over her carpet, invited me in, and offered me tea. Her husband said 'Don't you know there are alligators in those canals?'

"I asked to use the phone to call my husband to come and get me and no questions were asked. He assumed I had stopped off at a friend's house. I soaked in a hot tub for an hour to get clean. Next day I retrieved the bicycle and it was just where I left it, but left my old shoes behind."


