#### A Tribute to Mary Ann Canfield, by Art Dycke

In a recent nomination of Jim Canfield as "Mayor of the Year", on behalf of the Historical Society, I made the statement, "There would not have been a City of Palm Coast Historical Society without him." Those words are equally true about his wife, Mary Ann Canfield.

Mary Ann was a guiding force of the Historical Society even before it was officially organized. Upon the appointment of myself and Margaret Davie as City Co-Historians in April, 2000, she provided us with the

names of long time residents to contact for our audio taped interviews and she participated in some of the tapings. Mary Ann typed the forms and popularized our "Who Was the First in Palm Coast" history project. When the City of Palm Coast Historical Society was formed, she became a Director.

ITT left us two file cabinets and 24 boxes of material in the summer of 2000 which we stored in City Manager Dick Kelton's office closet in the first location of City Hall in Palm Harbor Shopping Center. I sifted through all the material but it was Mary Ann that did the box by box listing, with the help of Claire Sheekey and Debby Geyer. Later, Mary Ann and our current President, Debby Geyer, transferred and recorded the COPCHS complete holdings in three moves to different storage areas and were the key individuals at the Society's fundraisers and community presentation activities. Mary Ann gave unstintingly of her time and effort to the COPCHS.

I know that Mary Ann kept a meticulous record, via scrapbooks, of all the events involved in the formation of the city and that she had newspaper clippings of almost all newsworthy events regarding the city of Palm Coast. She was the source of much information and many pictures in *Images of America: Palm Coast*. I called her many, many times while writing the book. Mary Ann Canfield's untimely death was a tragic loss to her husband, children, friends, the Historical Society, and the entire community.

#### My Friend and Co-Officer of the Historical Society, by Debby Geyer

I met Mary Ann when I became a member of the Historical Society and was instantly drawn to her outgoing personality, wonderful humor, and infectious laugh. Because of Mary Ann, I agreed to accept the nomination for President only if she would agree to be nominated for Vice President. She would call me and say "Hello Madam President" until I finally agreed and then she agreed to be nominated for Vice President! In the short time I knew her, we became friends and I think of Mary Ann frequently and miss her.

What I will always remember is a conversation we had when Jim Canfield was in the hospital and I called to see how he was doing. She said to me "I told the doctor he better cure him because I waited so long to find this wonderful man and I'm not going to lose him." Instead, Jim lost a beautiful, inside and out, wife and the community lost one of its most dedicated supporters. The Historical Society thanks you for all of your contributions and hard work in compiling the history of Palm Coast.



Gary Walters, 11/7/45-3/30/04, Lead Planner for ITT, by Jerry Full

Gary Walters was my friend, a colleague at ITT Community Development Corporation, and the man whose fingerprints are all over the community of Palm Coast.

He was the lead planner for ITT CDC from his employment in 1977 until his retirement when CDC began closing its doors in 1994. His office was the primary force that established the dozens of public parks, beach accesses and school sites, and it located and helped shape commercial, industrial and church structures

throughout Palm Coast. He was closely involved in the decision, and its implementation, to transform Palm Coast Parkway from a single road into separate east and west-bound parkways, a process then known as bifurcation, causing much confusion then, gratitude now.

One of the things he held on to against all foes, domestic and foreign, is the site now known as Town Center. This large tract was the envy of home builders, developers, government agencies. He wanted it saved and kept it saved against all comers as the eventual center of business in Palm Coast, now in process.

His untimely death in March of this year at the age of 58 was a shock to the hundreds of friends who worked with him over the formative years of this community's development and, indeed, a great loss to his charming wife, Barbara, and their children. I'm grateful to have known him, sad that he left us so young. So many of the things that we like about Palm Coast are things that are due, in large part, to Gary Walters.



#### Images of America: Palm Coast by local author, Art Dycke

The book is a compilation of 238 captioned photographs from the ITT (ICDC) files that are now held by the Palm Coast Historical Society. Contributions of local residents, reporters and newspapers are also included in the book. *Images* is a concise introduction to our area's history, organizations, people and their activities. Arcadia, the publisher, describes the book as follows:

"What is paradise? Before 1969, land that would eventually become the City of Palm Coast was considered by some as nothing more than a 'big pine-covered swamp.' But when the corporate eyes of ITT/Levitt and Sons looked upon the virtually uninhabited land, they saw 22,000 acres of golf courses, marinas, oceanfront motels, scenic drives, and house lots awaiting the arrival of sun-seeking 'pioneers.' Marketing strategies targeting urban residents in the North and Midwest offered slices of land cut out of miles of forest, and soon a 500-mile infrastructure of roads, utilities, and sewer lines bound Palm Coast to a future that included becoming the largest planned unit development in Florida history."
