
WHO HAS LIVED IN PALM COAST THE LONGEST? By Arthur E. Dycke Author of Images of America: Palm Coast

First I must explain to my readers that Palm Coast did not exist prior to 1969 when it was named by the ITT (International Telephone and Telegraph)// Levitt subsidiary after ITT/Rayonier had accumulated 68,000 acres of land to construct a major development in Flagler County, Florida.

With apologies to the very few persons who lived or worked in "the big pine covered swamp" that was to become Palm Coast, I began my search for our community's most long term residents by researching the first land and home purchases recorded by the ITT Corporation starting in January, 1972. The records showed that the first 25 lots sold were deeded to: Alex Korn, Matthew Sheehan, Atlantis Development Corporation, Ed White, Ed DiLeone, Vincent Moor, Charles Konopasek, Harry Fischer, David Barber, Sand and Tile, Inc., Henry Paoline, Douglas Guiler, Herbert Heckman, William Struby, Leroy Laig, Walter Kopecky, Ed Goodwin, William Loeb, Lynn Wicklan, Caleb Swink, Bernadette and William Collier (May 19, 1972, Lot 4, Block 7, Palm Coast CCC (Country Club Cove), S-8, Nunzio Palladino, Joseph Malatino, Donald Miller and Alexander Korn.

In my book, under the caption,"The Pioneers Arrive 1972". the story continues. One of the most exciting days in Palm Coast's short history took place on January 21, 1972, when Mr. and Mrs. Matthew Sheehan proceeded to move into their new home as Palm Coast's first residents "They were followed by Mr. and Mrs. Vincent Moore and Mr. and Mrs. Charles Konopasek. I have spoken to many of our earliest residents and they have told me that all but one of the first 25 property owners listed above have moved or passed away and a recent check of the Flagler telephone book seems to confirm that the above mentioned Bernadette and William Collier are indeed the couple who have lived in Palm Coast the longest.

There are many worthwhile stories to be told about how our earliest settlers coming from all parts of the country survived in a strange environment with very few services available at first. I offer this picture from The Flagler Tribune, dated December 28, 1972 as evidence that many like the Collier's immediately immersed themselves in community activities.


When ITT opened it's Palm Coast Yacht Club facility in December of 1972 it created a religious, political and social center for the entire community. There were parties, dances, club socials, art shows, charity benefits and a variety of dignitaries and entertainers brought in by ITT to showcase their new planned community. A photo in my book (not reproduced in this article) shows Bernadette Collier with

movie celebrity Barbara Britton who was filming an ITT commercial in 1973. Other early Palm Coast visitors included Merve Griffin, James Garner, Duke Snyder, Truman Capote and Gloria Steinham.

The following photo shows William and Bernadette Collier relaxing on their patio with their lovely daughter Sally. Pioneer romance blossomed when Sally met Dr. Jack Dunn's son Robert. The wedding took place on September 17, 1977 at St. Mark's By The Sea (Palm Coast's first church) with pastor Mark Otterbein co- presiding. Robert and Sally Dunn still own property in Palm Coast.
