In late 1978 a group of friends, Sue & John Dressel, Ethel & Joe Doyle, and Ed & Marge Staley, came up with an idea to form a social club where friends and neighbors could gather monthly for an evening of socializing. So, January 1979 a notice was put in the local newspaper that anyone interested in joining a social club should contact John. The response was very encouraging; the result, the Irish Social Club was born.

On February 8, 1979 the first Irish Social Club meeting was held at the yacht club with about 60 members present; the following were elected officers: President, John Dressel; Vice President, Joseph Doyle; Secretary, Marge Staley; Treasurer, Ed Kelly. Elected Directors were Joe Hennessy, Tom Kelly, and Ed Staley.

Muriel Moore was appointed to chair the By-Laws Committee assisted by Dot & John Gilbert and Peg Morris. On March 22 the first by-laws were unanimously accepted to read:

Name: Irish Social Club of Palm Coast Purpose: The purpose of this organization shall be primarily social and charitable within our community. This organization shall operate on a non-profit basis.

Membership: Open to all Initiation Fee: \$10.00 Dues: \$5.00 per year

Fiscal year to begin and end on St. Patrick's

Day, March 17.

The first St. Patrick's Dinner Dance was held on March 9, 1980 at Oceanside Country Club with 58 members in attendance.

The first golf tournament was held November 21, 1980 and continues today to raise funds for charity.

Since its inception in 1979, the Irish Social Club has been very active raising funds for numerous organizations in the community. The first were donations to the Volunteer Fire Department and the Flagler County Humane Society. The club has also granted scholarships annually to two graduating high school seniors.

One of its largest social events was hosting the St. Patrick's Day Parade from 2004 to 2010. Area Irish Americans and Ancient Order of Hibernians

brought the first St. Patrick's Day Parade in all of Florida history to Palm Coast in March 1973.

The proposed bylaws were presented by Committee Chairman Muriel Moore. The proposals were amended and the revised edition accepted. They will be presented for final vote at the April meeting. The group will apply for a charter at that time.

\$10 per person initiation fee. The fiscal year is to begin and end, appropriately enough, on St. Patrick's Day, March 17.

Marge and Jack Keegan will head the entertainment committee. Boots and Lin Linford will head the social committee; community projects will be the responsibility of Pauline and Francis Lagerman; membership and publicity will be handled by Sue Dressel with Ethel Doyle.

The Irish Social Club recognizes its responsibility as a member of the general community and have contributed generous funds raised by the club's social functions to various civic and social agencies in Flagler County.



Irish Social Club pays tribute to 14 years of past presidents

PALM COAST — From a nucleus in 1978 of three couples — the John Dressels, the Ed Staleys and the Joe Doyles — the Irish Social Club of Palm Coast has grown to about 230 members with a long waiting list of prospective members.

From the original six, the first meeting drew 58 charter members and the Irish Social Club was ready to make its mark and influence felt in the then-smaller Palm Coast.

The ISC, organized as a social and charitable organization, has kept its word. Socially, every dinner, golf tournament, St. Patrick's Day dinner dance and picnic has been a sellout. As a result of these successful fundraising activities, the ISC has given cash donations over the years exceeding \$15,000 to various civic and charitable organizations in Flagler County.

Each agency is investigated by a carefully

chosen committee to ensure the donation is needed and will be well spent.

At the last dinner meeting former presidents were honored. Among the former presidents honored were Mimy Glancy who fondly recalled receiving the gavel (and a kiss) from Kenny Watts as the first woman president. Earl Kauffman recalled he had a roving microphone and would bring it to the tables of members and guests and introduce them to the members.

"It brought people together," he said.

Dick Mathey recalled how much the members enjoyed themselves.

Tom Kelly remembered the growth of the club during his term and the very successful St. Patrick's golf tournaments and dinner dances.

Marty Healty thought of his term as president as "a lot of enjoyable work." The ISC is looking forward to its annual picnic at Bulow State Park from noon to 5 p.m. May 27.



specifically with Scot-Irish ancestry.


